TRAVEL NEWS

The Travel Group started the New Year with a flurry of activity, beginning with a visit organised by Jenny to Loughborough on 26th January, taking in the delightful Charnwood Museum in the morning, and then Taylor's Bell Foundry in the afternoon. Both visits were most enjoyable and informative, and we were fortunate enough to see the casting process in action at the Foundry. This is one of only two working bell foundries in the country, and still occupies the purpose-built premises opened in 1840. Many of the processes have changed little since Victorian times, and we had a fascinating glimpse of this rather unusual industry. The five level tuning process was particularly interesting, and we also spent some time in the tiny museum. Taylor's has also cast a huge aluminium bell which will form part of the Olympic display.

Then on 31st January, Barry arranged a trip to the Leonardo da Vinci exhibition at the National Gallery in London. As well as this main event, the day allowed free time to see other paintings in the same gallery, or the David Hockney exhibition or simply to enjoy being in London. Although it was a cold day, we managed to keep dry, and we certainly got very warm in the exhibition itself which was very crowded. It proved to be an excellent and rare opportunity to see so many of these wonderful works in one place.

Another trip to London is planned for the end of March, when Jenny has organised a guided tour of the Olympic site, taking in the main stadium, the Aquatic Centre and the Olympic Village. £19 – book without delay!

May is another busy month for the U3A 'travellers' with a four-night stay in Paris, travelling via Eurostar. Then on 11th, there is a coach trip to the Malvern Spring Gardening Show at the Three Counties Showground.
