POMPEII EXHIBITION At the British Museum, London Thursday, 2 May 2013

AD 79. In just 24 hours, two cities in the Bay of Naples in southern Italy were buried by a catastrophic eruption of Mount Vesuvius. Preserved under ash, their rediscovery nearly 1.700 years later provided an unparalleled glimpse into the daily life of the Roman Empire. From the bustling street to the intimate spaces of a Roman home, this exhibition will take you to the heart of people's lives in Pompeii and Herculaneum.

ARCHAEOLOGY

A planning meeting was held on 22 November to establish a provisional programme for 2013. After discussion, it was agreed to hold a series of six talks by Peter Liddle (former County Archaeologist) during the winter months, each introducing a period of the County's history, and to use these themes as a loose framework for a variety of visits in the intervening months. A number of group members will be involved in putting the programme into effect.

Shirley will also be organising the third of the Welford Cemetery visits in the springtime, in addition to the outline programme below. Actual dates and details will be confirmed in due course, but so far it looks like this

- 17 Jan: <u>Talk</u>: Early Prehistoric Leicestershire (First humans to farmers and introduction of metal)
- 14 Feb: <u>Talk</u>: Iron Age Leicestershire (Hillforts and beginnings of urban life before Roman Conquest)
- 14 Mar: <u>Talk</u>: Roman Leicestershire (Transformation during the 400 years as part of the Roman Empire)
- April: Nottingham Caves and Tunnels (+ Museum of Justice?)
- May: Wall Roman site, lunch and Lichfield Cathedral)
- June: Stokesay Castle and Ludlow Food Centre/Land of Lost Content
- July: Burrough Hill fort (and excavations?)
- Aug: Wrest Park, Bedfordshire
- Sept:: Pugin's Church (St Giles) at Cheadle (+ another venue TBA)
- Oct: Anglo-Saxon Re-enactment
- Oct/Nov: <u>Talk</u>: Early Anglo-Saxon Leicestershire (Exploration of life and death through archaeological discoveries) + Planning Meeting for 2014
- Nov: <u>Talk</u>: Mercian, Viking and Norman Leicestershire (The heart of Mercia, until the Viking invaders)
- Dec: <u>Talk</u>: Medieval Leicestershire (Villages, open fields, castles and abbeys, plus famine, pestilence and war)

TRAVEL GROUP REPORT 2012

The Travel Group has enjoyed another year of day outings and the annual visit to Wengen in Switzerland. Day outings began with a very interesting trip to Loughborough where we viewed the Museum followed by a visit to Taylor's Bellfoundry. We learned that there are now only two firms producing bells in the UK, Whitechapel Bellfoundry in London and Taylor's in Loughborough. They have a world-wide reputation for quality; this was borne out for me when I heard on the news that the bells damaged in the New Zealand earthquake had been returned to Taylor's for repair or renewal! It was fascinating to see the processes which go into the production of bells and to me the highlight was the walk through the area where the bells were cast.

Many thanks to Barry Hillyard for arranging our trip to the De Vinci Exhibition at the National Gallery in London in February. We had time to tour the many Galleries and view this popular exhibition without the extensive queues which were evident outside the building. Barry is arranging a visit to the Pompeii Exhibition at the British Museum on 2 May 2013.

In late March, on what turned out to be a very warm day, we visited the Olympics Site and, accompanied by London Walks Guides, we walked from Stratford Tube Station to the Olympic site where we were given a very good overview of how it had all been planned and how it would all operate during the Olympics. This was followed mid-May by a visit to the Spring Flower Show at Malvern; again we were lucky with the weather because the day before our visit the show had almost been washed out with a huge amount of rain. Many group members bought mementos in the way of plants and items for the garden.

In May a small group visited Paris using the Eurostar train – a new experience for many of us in the party. We had a guided bus tour on our first morning in Paris followed by a boat trip on the Seine and then free time to walk around the sights, visit one of the many museums or simply enjoy the tourist bus allowing one to get on and off at will. On our last day in Paris, Barry Hillyard arranged a group visit to Versailles which was spectacular in its opulence.

In early June we visited Baddesley Clinton and Packwood House; unfortunately I was unable to go due to minor illness, but I soon found a kindly stand-in, Barry Hillyard – many thanks. Barry reported that the day to these National Trust properties had gone well

Mid-June was given over to our week in Wengen. This year a larger than usual party travelled so that I was able to reduce the cost significantly! As I have stated on many occasions the scenery is absolutely stunning, but only if it is not enveloped in cloud! This year, again, we were so lucky because the weather before we arrived was cold, wet and cloudy. We did have a little rain, but we also enjoyed some lovely weather and very clear days to make the most of the views and the flowers. Everyone enjoyed the holiday and many of our U3A first-time visitors are making a return visit on our 2013 visit to Wengen!

After a Summer break, we visited the town of Tewkesbury, where we were taken on a guided walk and viewed old buildings and architecture in this historical town. We had just enough time to view the Abbey and take a quick lunch before the coach drove through some very pleasant countryside to Weston's Cider factory. We enjoyed a tour of the cider factory where we were shown the processes which go to into the production of cider. This was followed by a lovely tasting session and quite a few members solved some of their Christmas shopping problems with bottles of cider (or that's what they told me)! Again, a very bad weather forecast had us all taking our waterproofs; in the event the only shower we experienced was when we were touring the cider factory.

Our last outing this year was the visit to the Houses of Parliament. As last year, the group visited by invitation from our local MP, the Rt Hon Andrew Robathan. We entered by the Westminster Hall entrance and having passed through 'security' we met our guides who explained much of the history which has given rise to many of the customs which are still observed today. We marvelled at the architecture of the buildings, viewed paintings depicting historical battles and events, were shown the monarch's entrance and visited the Queen's robing room and the House of Lords. After lunch we were given tickets to visit the public gallery of either the House of Commons or Lords, where we listened to debates which were taking place on amendments to Acts relating to Health and Safety at Work; we were also lucky enough to witness a 'division' take place. We then met in the Central Lobby



to be escorted to the terrace for afternoon tea. As Andrew Robathan had been called away we met another MP – Alec Shelbrook – MP for Leeds. He talked of his experiences as an MP new to this Parliament and how, on being elected, he had been inundated with emails

and telephone calls questioning him on matters of which he knew very little; which necessitated a very steep learning curve! He also told us that the 'maiden speech' was not such an ordeal as following speeches because no interruptions are allowed whereas in the case of later speeches MPs could interrupt and ask questions which sometimes required very quick, 'on your feet', thinking. In answer to a question from one of our group on Europe he explained some of the problems and likely implications for UK business of decisions relating to Europe (I wonder how he voted on the EU Budget). This visit was arranged and accompanied by Mrs Ruth Morrison who, before retirement, worked with the local Conservative Association – many thanks to Ruth.

I think you will agree that this year's outings have been very varied and interesting. This is due to you, the members of Countesthorpe U3A, because they are all your suggestions. Next year's plans include a week's holiday by coach to Llandudno and area, a week in Wengen in early September and a day outing to the British Museum to view the Pompeii Exhibition on 2 May. Please can you help me by completing one of my suggestion forms for both day outings and longer breaks and possibly a week's coach holiday in 2014. No matter what it is, please let me know so that I can give it consideration.
